I. Meeting was called to order at 4:01 by Kerrie Albert. Minutes were approved, and introductions were made.

II. Report from Chair:

Kerrie Albert: NACDAC continues to work with FBHS on the RTI program, which provides tutoring and resources for at-risk students. Responsible Beverage Server Training will be offered four times in September for vendors with liquor licenses in the county. We are working with the police department and DEA to hold another Prescription Take Back Day on October 29. Kerrie distributed and reviewed a chart showing measures from two of our logic models and how the data has improved as a result of our strategies. Dr. Seidel commented that we can use such information as a sharing tool.

Susan Woodford: We are getting EUDL money, which we'll use for youth and youth social norms. Teens for Change at YHS is working with the homeless, transportation issues and ideas for a teen center. Last year, the FBHS youth presented ideas to the School Board, and some were enacted; they will be doing this again this year. Susan is working with our Regional Alliance, as a Managing Entity is selected for our region. Proposals are due August 24, and this will affect where dollars come from and where they go. The Prevention Conference will be held in October, and one stakeholder will attend along with NACDAC staff. We are about to start year three of our DFC grant and will continue with our strategies. NACDAC has received its DCF license (level 1 prevention).

III. New Business/Presentation:

Officer Aaron Bass gave a presentation on D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), a ten-week program offered to all fifth grade classes in Nassau. He interacts with students, talks about alcohol, marijuana and tobacco and teaches them such things as standing up and telling other kids "no" and choosing the right friends. The program is grant-funded and is a hands-on experience that makes it fun for the kids.

IV. Reports from Agencies/Members:

Mary Ruth Murray (Sutton Place): Susan Clark has been promoted to Senior Project SUCCESS Counselor. Sutton Place now offers in-home and in-school counseling and is providing a mental health program at YHS. Sutton Place is offering several groups, including anger management and parenting.

Laureen Pagel (Sutton Place): they are fully staffed at the schools, and open access continues at Sutton Place. They are looking at the needs of the schools, including mental health.

Amy Pipkin (CIS): they got their grants so will be continuing as usual. They will work with any youth with any need, with a focus on helping students succeed academically.

Bart Clark (God's Army): they have gotten their 501c status. They are looking at three pieces of property for a day program and after-school care, but there are money issues. He is working with SWAT on a PSA commercial, and he also works with kids who need community service hours.

Dr. Seidel (DOH): There will be a health planning process meeting on 8/24 at the Full Service School, and NACDAC members are welcome. DOH offers confidential HIV and STD testing.

Susan Silva (DJJ): Their caseload has gone from 40-45 to 22, and they will be taking more clients in Duval County (north of the airport).

Pam Hill (FSS): they have twelve kids on the Jaguars Honor Row program, where the kids pledge to stay away from tobacco, alcohol and drugs and then get to attend a Jaguars game.

David Bishop (FBPD): They conducted compliance checks at the bars (two violations) and stores (100% compliance) and continue with beach patrol, DUI checks and party patrol. They had a training for their officers last month to learn more about conducting strategies like party patrol, and he feels they got good information.

Renee Braddock (NCSO): they conducted their annual compliance checks at over 200 outlets. The high schools still have SROs, but the middle schools don't.
