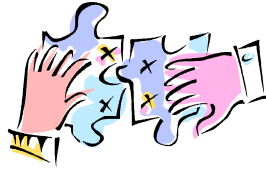

I. Meeting was called to order at 4:00 by Kerrie Albert.

II. Minutes were approved.

III. Introductions were made.

IV. Report from Chair:

Susan Woodford: Tonight is a meeting with business, city, county and Chamber leaders regarding the proposal to allow establishments to serve alcohol starting at 7:00 a.m. on Sundays and to get rid of two other alcohol restrictions. We are holding Responsible Beverage Training at the end of May and will also do a train-the-trainer.

The K-2 bill is in its final vote toward passage. The House Party bill is also passing, and fines will go up for social hosting.

We'll be printing a Know the Law book (localizing it for Nassau) so that kids and parents will know what the penalties are for breaking the law.

The Drug Take Back program will be held at Publix on April 23 – please take flyers and distribute. A press release will be going out.

V. New Business/Presentation:

Latrece Rowell talked about the Florida Community Prevention Center (previously called Healing BALM). It is an outreach agency that provides training, awareness and testing for HIV and STDs in Nassau, Duval, Baker and Clay Counties. Its four units are Risk Reduction, Youth Development, Prison Re-entry and Community Revitalization, and it also works with domestic violence, sexual assaults and a DUI program. The agency is primarily funded through federal grants.

VI. Reports from Agencies/Members:

Sergeant Sanderson provided the report of April arrests/warnings for the Community Policing Program, beach patrol, compliance buys and traffic arrests. FBPD arrested ten Georgia youth drinking on the beach.

She described responding to a 21 year old who had taken K-2 and was alternately bouncing off the walls, hallucinating and hitting the floor. Sergeant Sanderson passed K-2 around to NACDAC members and stated that this substance is not illegal, is fairly inexpensive and can be bought over the internet. It is a natural blend of herbs and spices to which synthetic THC has been added. This substance goes by names such as Spice, Blue Lotus, Skunk, Genie and Skullcap. It can cause anger, psychiatric issues and even death.

(Reported for) Kim Clemons: They have received a mini grant for \$1,000 for underwear for homeless kids.

Nick Clark: The Teens for Change at YHS will participate in the Shrimp Festival parade handing out cards with information to parents and passing out candy to kids. They are dog walking at the Humane Society to get their name out there. They are trying to start a teen club for FBHS and YHS students next school year, and they may start doing Adopt-a-Highway.

Susan Woodford: The Fernandina Beach youth group has been using SPF (the Strategic Planning Process) and will be presenting its issues to the School Board. Issues include social norming, sex education, possibly school uniforms and other ideas. This presentation will be on May 12 at 5:00 p.m. at the School Board meeting in the Atlantic Administration building.

Jennifer Emmons: Rick Bender will be speaking about the dangers of spit tobacco on Thursday and Friday, April 21 and 22 at the schools.

Kara Williams: FSS' next breakfast learning series will be held on Tuesday, April 26 from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. FSS is hiring for three Nassau positions, one of which is part time. She reported on a partnership with Gateway. Resources are available to do in-home treatment; if not effective, they can offer residential treatment.

Susan suggested that Kara talk about FSS' services to the guidance counselors and at Student Advisory Committee (SAC) meetings.
